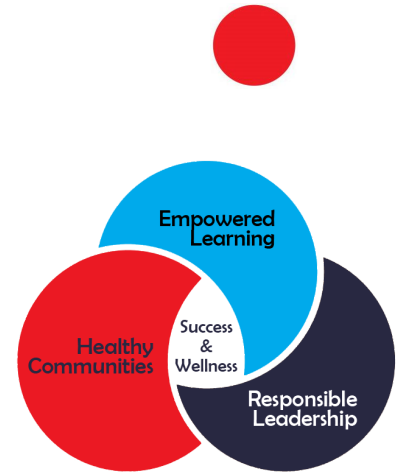


Morinville Public School Education Plan 2024 -2027

Goal One: Empowered Learning

Students demonstrate strong achievement across provincial learning outcomes, engage critically and continuously progress as learners.

Increase academic achievement by using evidence-based strategies, such as the use of number lines, to develop foundational numeracy skills. Students will show numeracy growth in post-intervention assessments through differentiated instruction tailored to their individual needs.

Highlight - Literacy & Numeracy Instruction:

Literacy and Numeracy centres are structured around evidence-based practices that foster foundational skills, critical thinking, and meaningful engagement. In literacy, this includes a focus on phonemic awareness, phonics, vocabulary, reading fluency, and comprehension, all tailored to developmental stages. Numeracy centers emphasize number sense, counting, early operations, and problem-solving, as well as building confidence with numbers through hands-on activities and real-life applications.





Goal Two: **Healthy School Communities**

Students belong and learn in environments that support their needs. Public confidence is built when system resources are used to ensure optimum learning for all.

Highlight - Indigenous Student Success and Building a Culture of Belonging:

Our school actively applies foundational knowledge about First Nations, Métis, and Inuit histories and cultures and is working to embed this practice into teaching and learning. To help build a culture of belonging and foundational understanding, there is a monthly visit from a knowledge keeper who meets with classes to build relationships and teach and share traditional drumming at school assemblies. This valuable presence reinforces our commitment to Indigenous education, creating powerful, whole-school learning experiences. By incorporating these interactions into the curriculum and engaging with diverse, authentic resources, we foster respect for Indigenous perspectives and contemporary contexts. Together, these efforts empower Indigenous student success and nurture a welcoming culture for all.

Highlight - Leadership for Students and Staff

Our education plan emphasizes both student and staff engagement by fostering leadership, collaboration, and shared expertise within our school community. Through the Student Leadership Club, students are empowered to influence school culture and gain essential skills in teamwork and decision-making. Teachers also step into leadership roles by serving as acting administrators when administration is absent, leading grade-level or subject cohorts, and presenting peer-led professional development sessions that showcase innovative classroom practices. Additionally, we support a mentorship program, pairing experienced teachers with newer colleagues to encourage professional growth and collaboration. These initiatives together create a dynamic, supportive environment that values continuous learning and community building for both students and staff.
